The Humane Society of North Texas Is at Crisis Level Overcapacity and Needs Community Involvement

Adopt. Foster. Donate. Volunteer

Who: The Humane Society of North Texas (HSNT) has close to 1,100 pets in its care, with nearly half being dogs, especially dogs over 30 pounds. This has resulted in dogs being kept in pop-up crates in hallways and in offices just to find a place to house them. HSNT needs community involvement in the form of adoption or fostering of large dogs to free up kennel space. If you can't foster or adopt, please consider volunteering to walk dogs in the morning or donating to help fund moving dogs to other areas of the country that have a little space.

Where: Dallas/Fort Worth Metroplex

Why: HSNT, along with most North Texas animal shelters, is dealing with over crowding in its facilities due to the high number of owner surrenders and strays. Currently, there are significantly more pets available than there are people actively looking to adopt.

Additional Information: To help adopt out large dogs, HSNT is waiving all adoption fees for dogs over 6 months old and more than 30 pounds. In addition, HSNT is offering a \$250 incentive to people willing to temporarily foster a large dog – you can help save the life of a precious pet in need!
